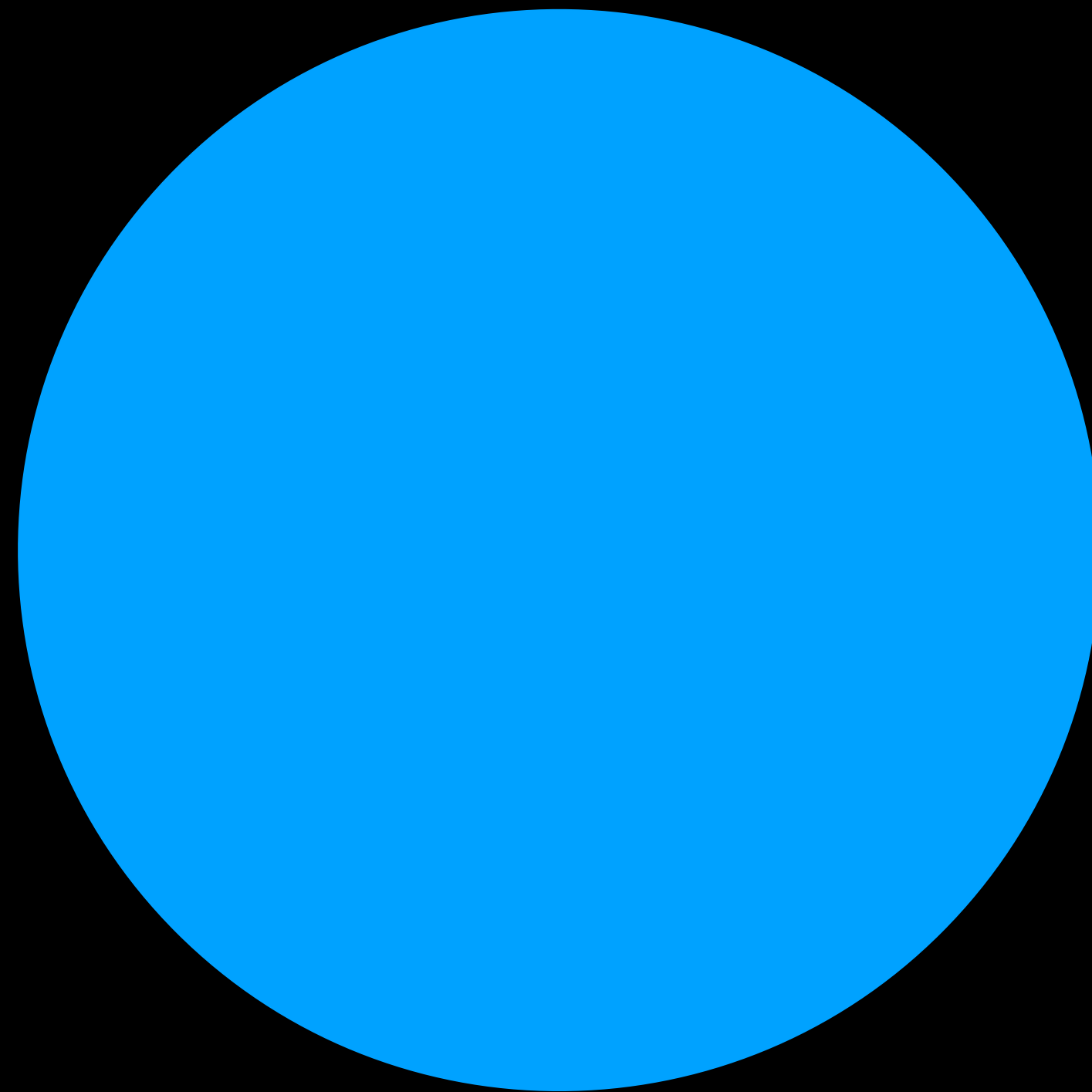

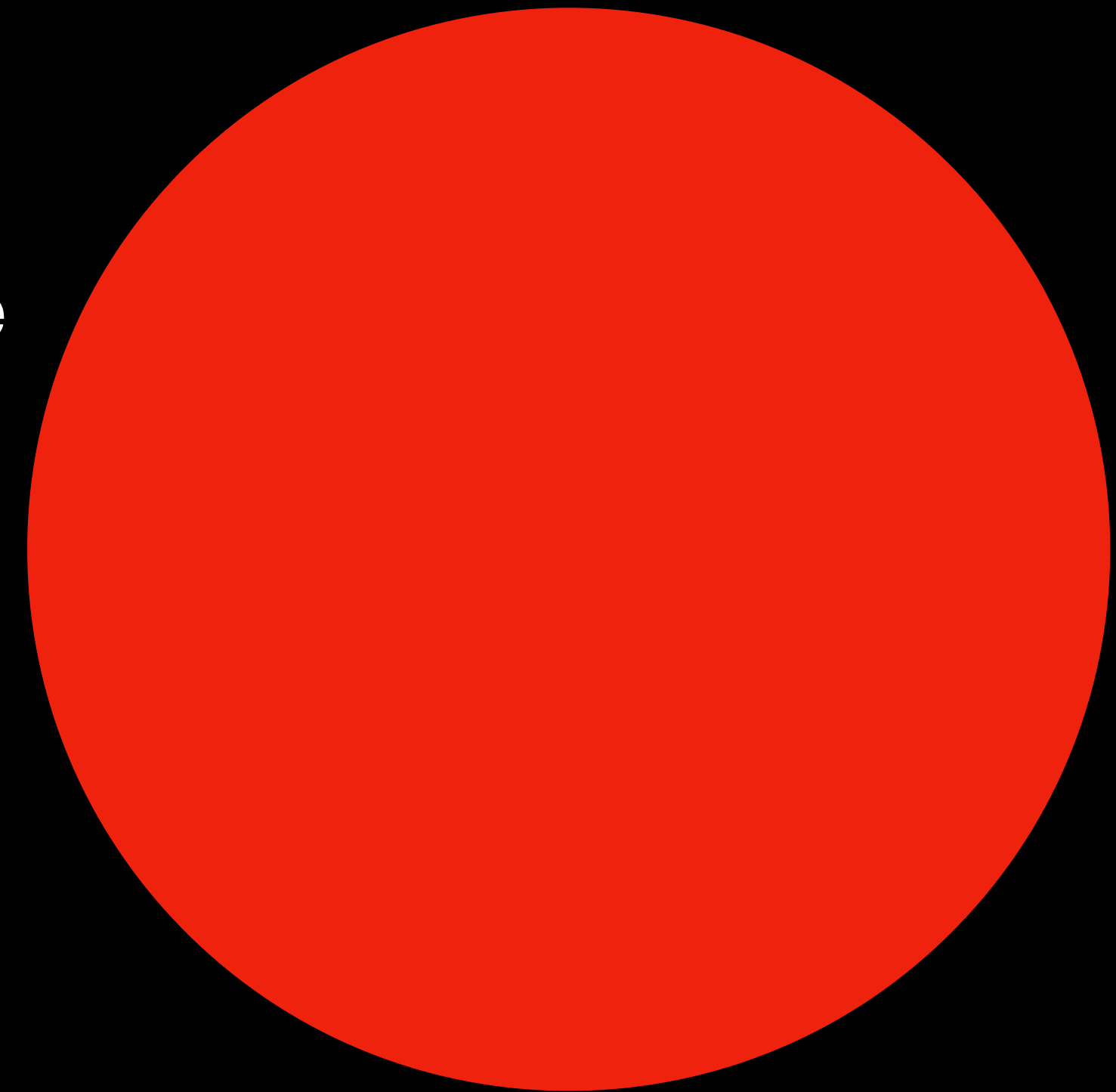

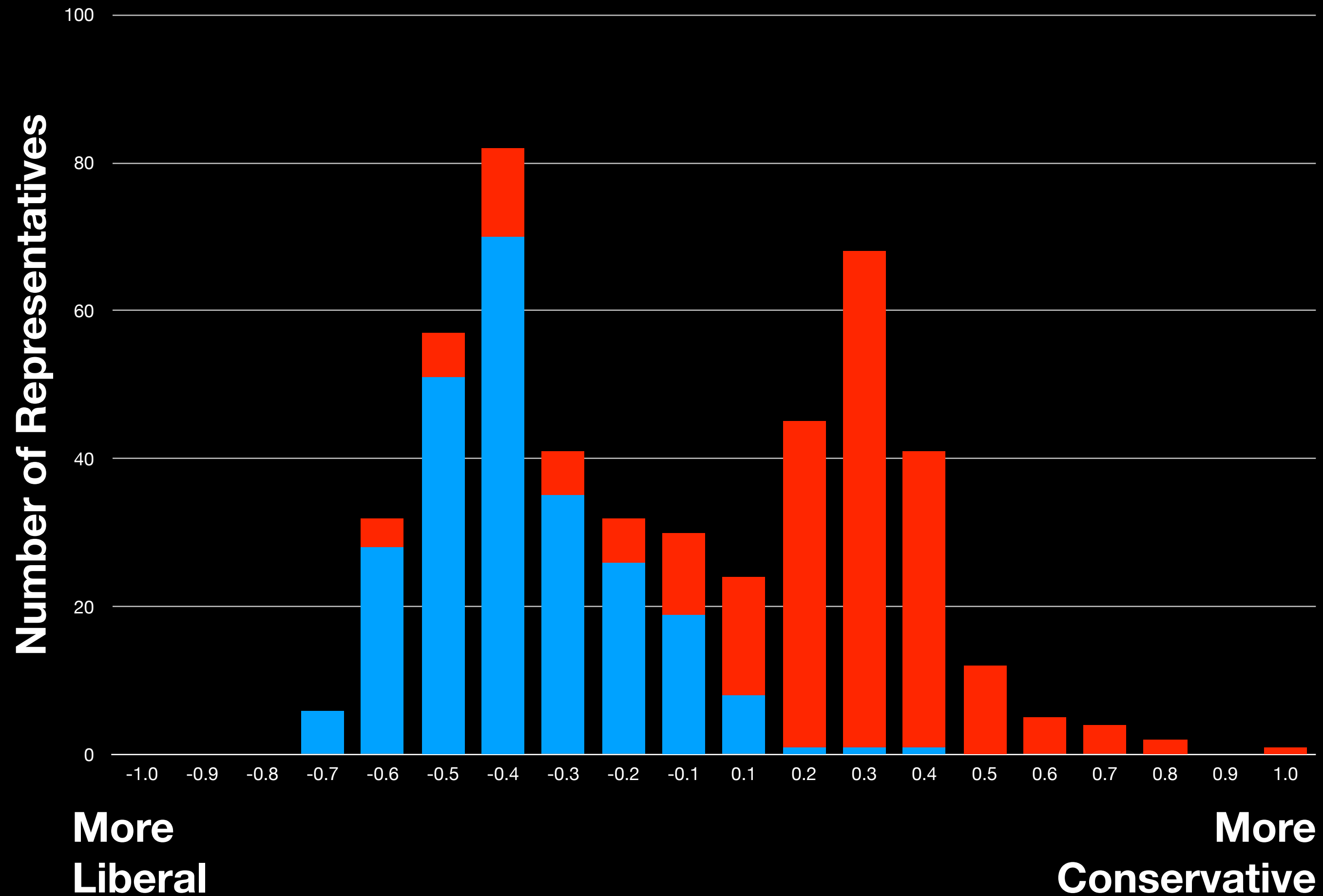

Polarization in Congress

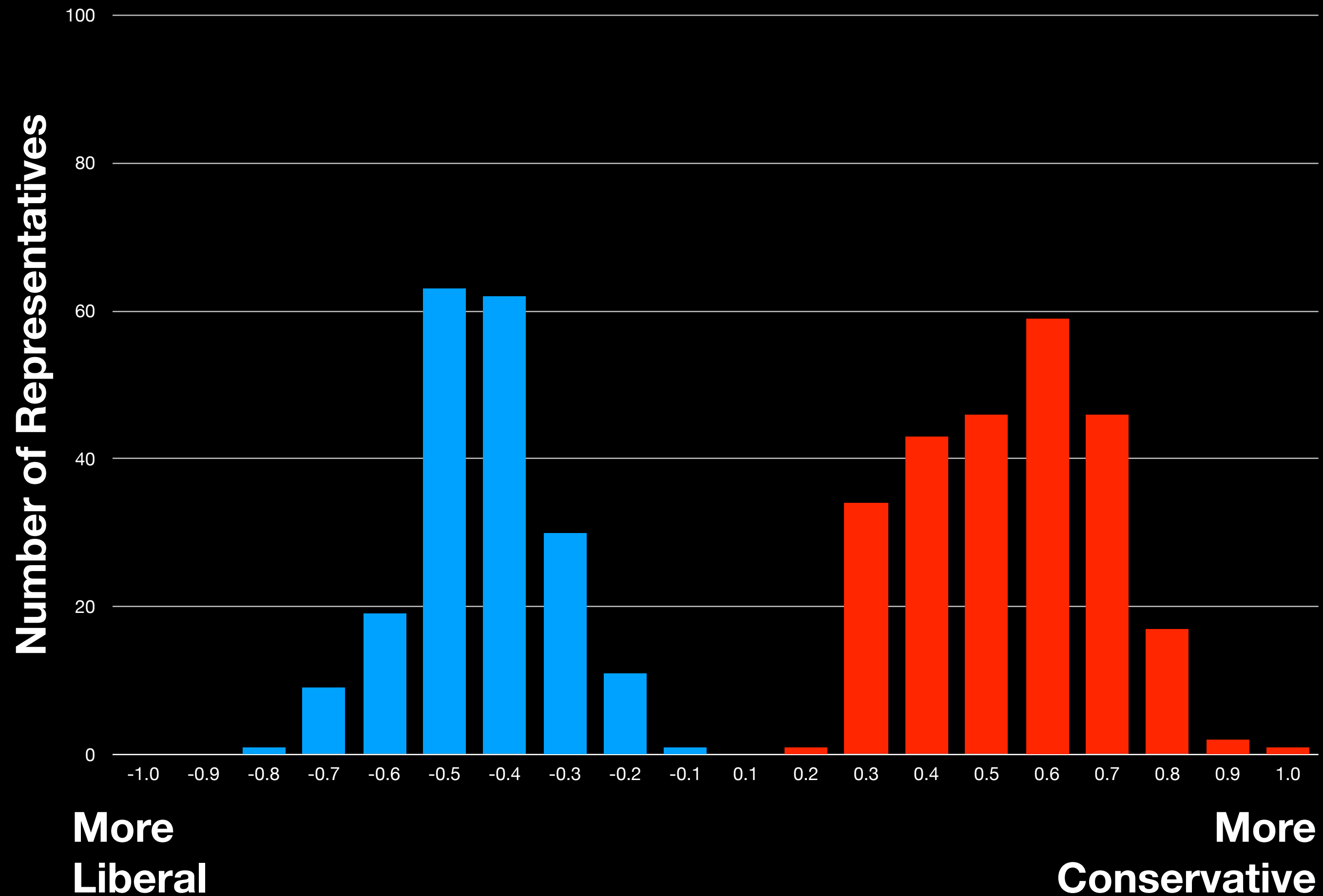
93rd Congress, 1973-1975

115th Congress, 2017-2019

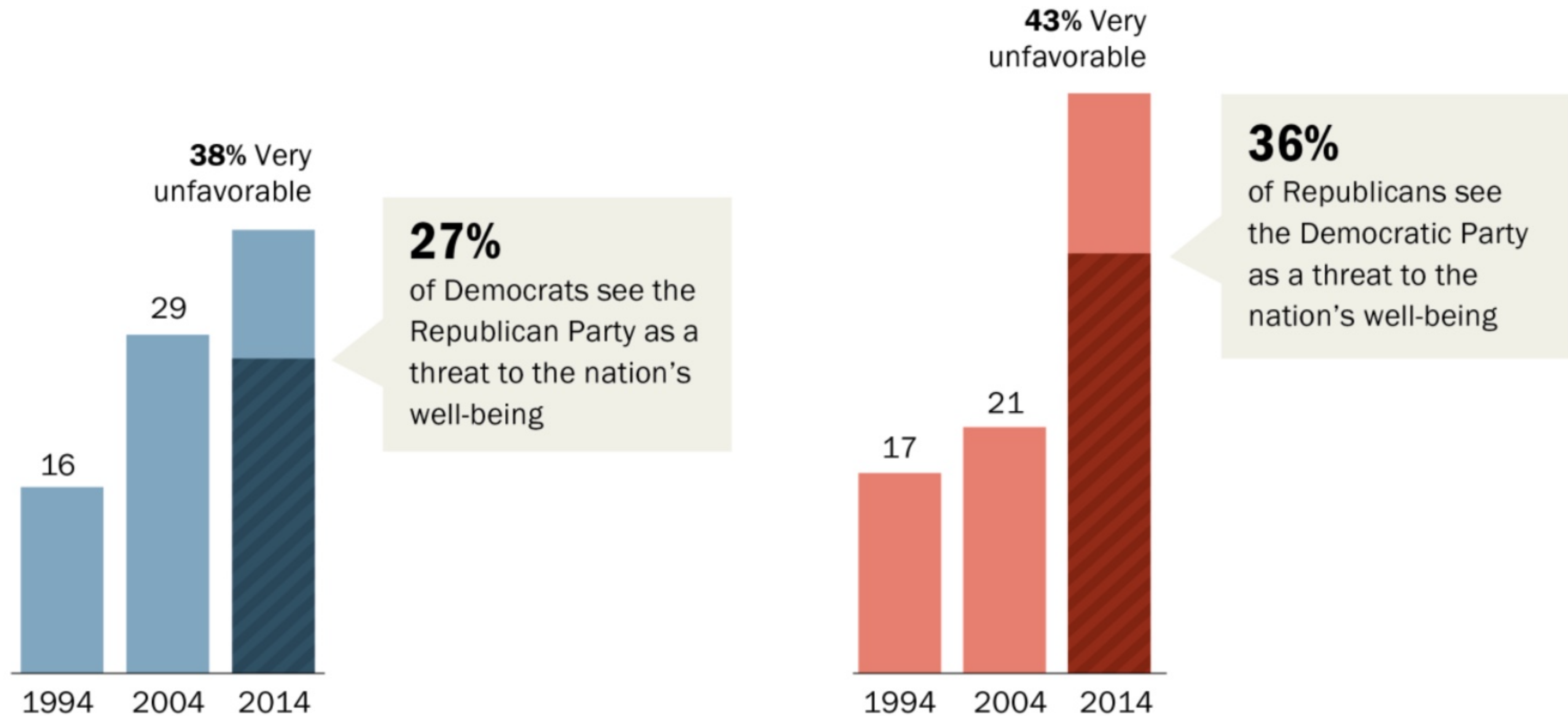

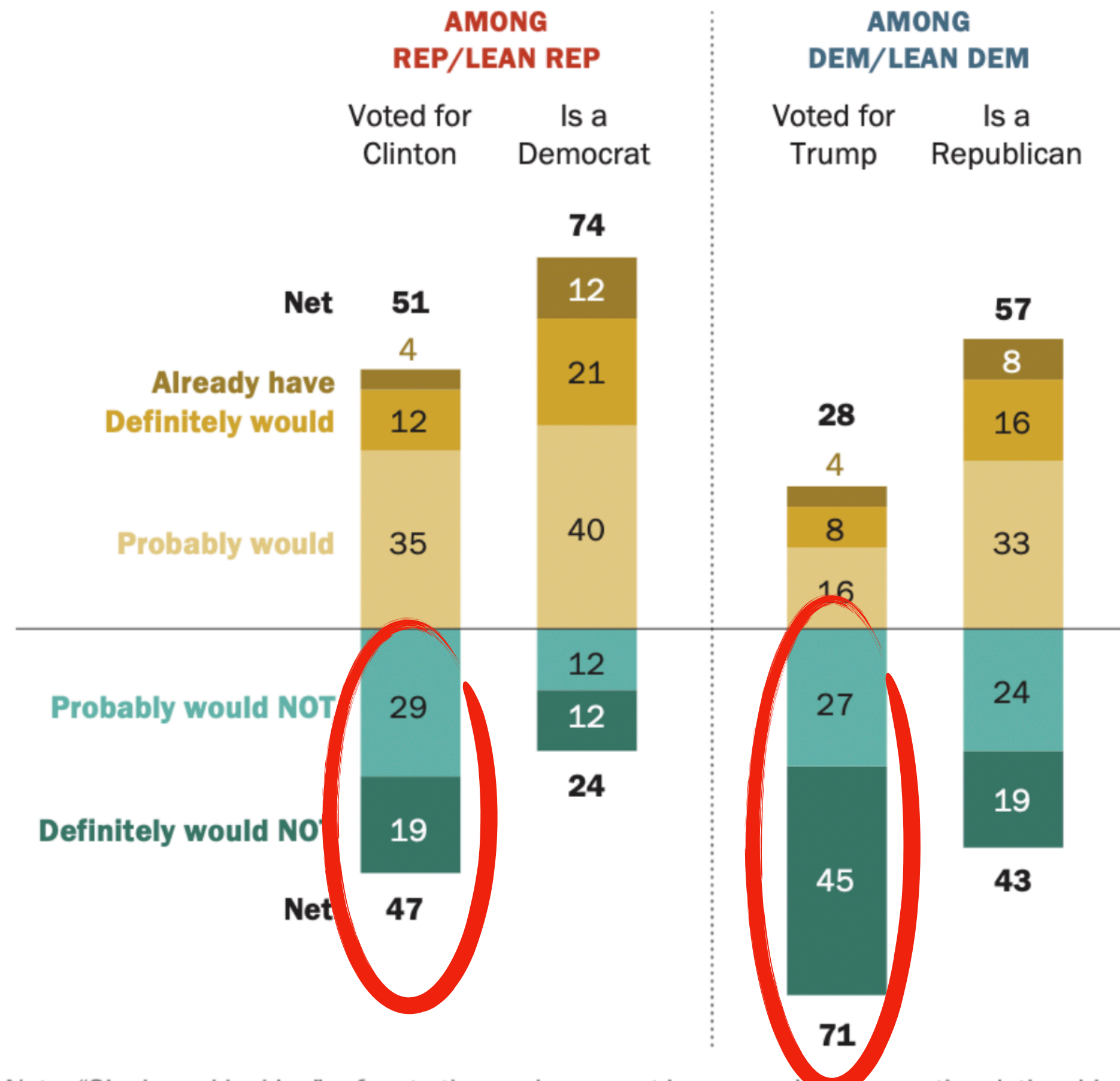
Notes: Questions about whether the Republican and Democratic Parties are a threat to the nation's well being asked only in 2014.

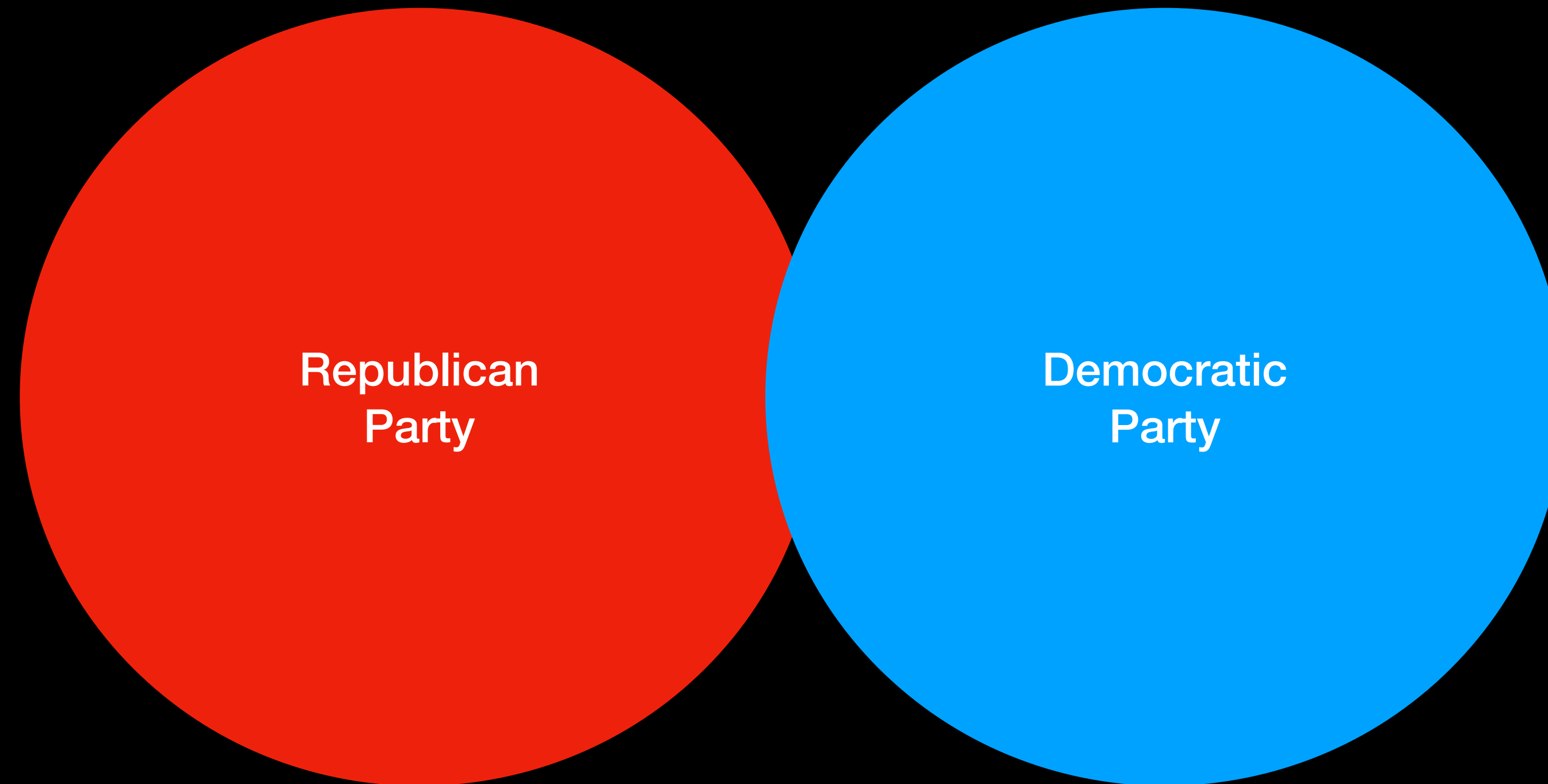

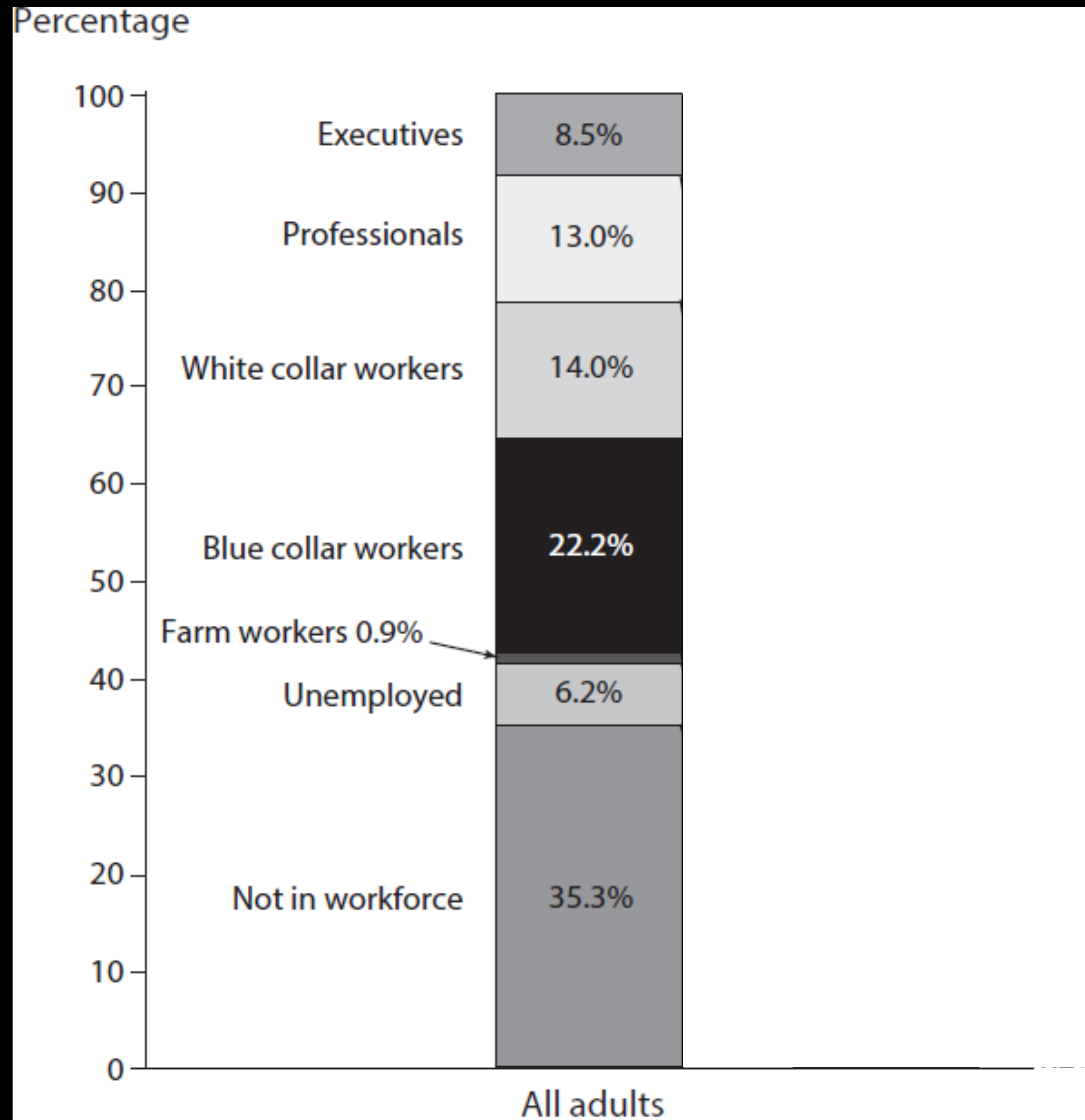
1976-2016 US Politics



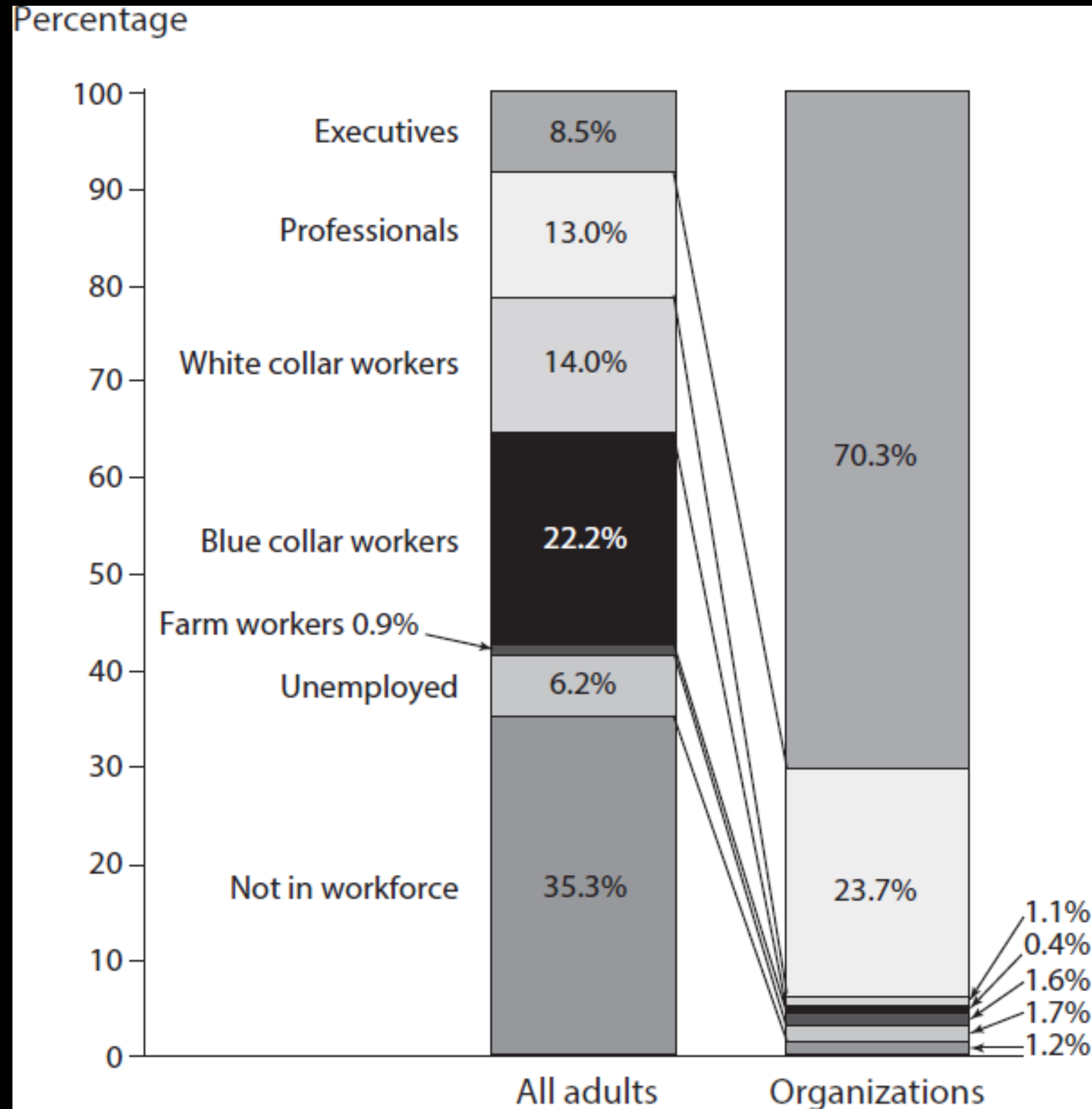

But this was democracy for the top 10%, according to Affluence and Influence.

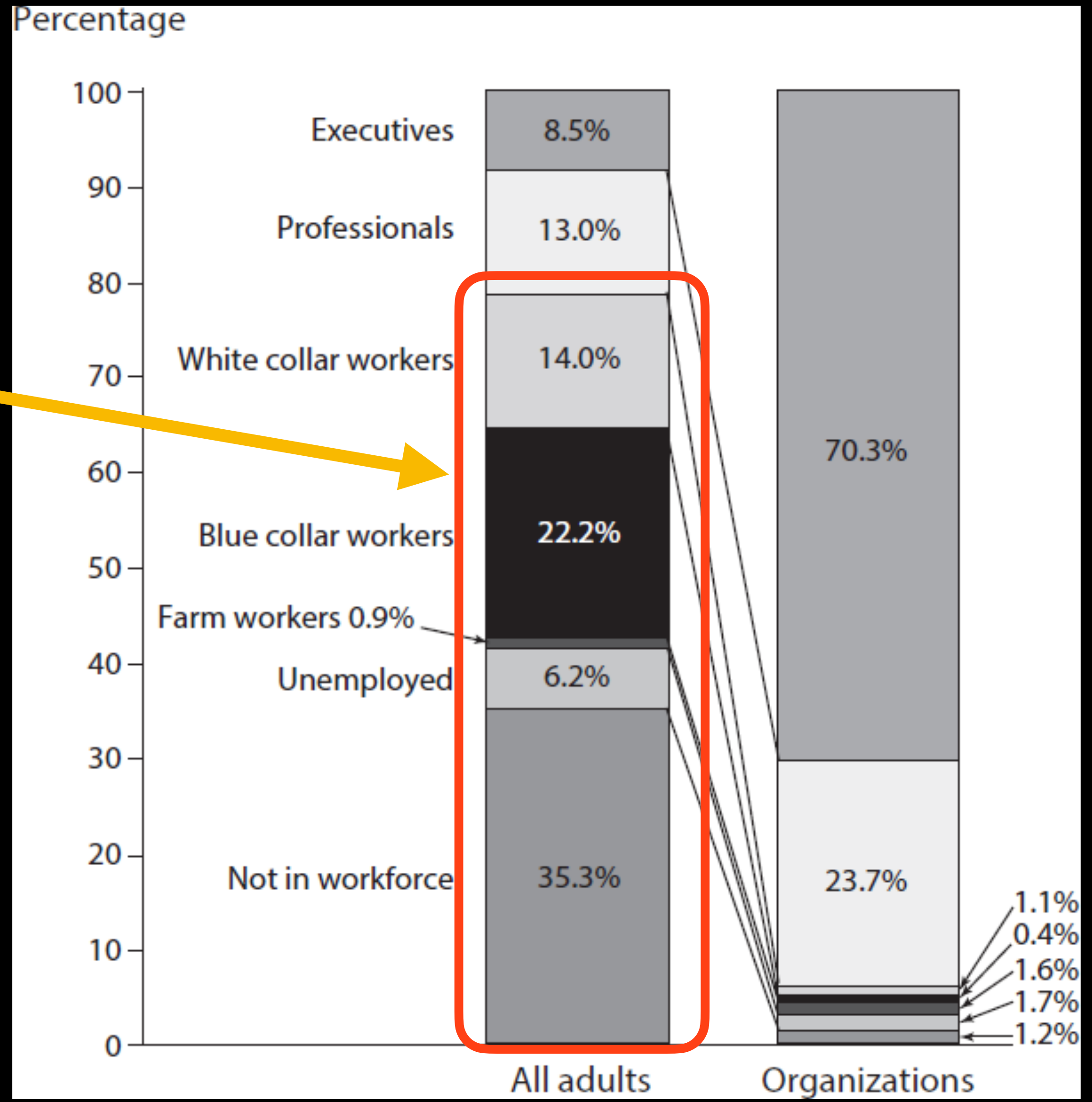

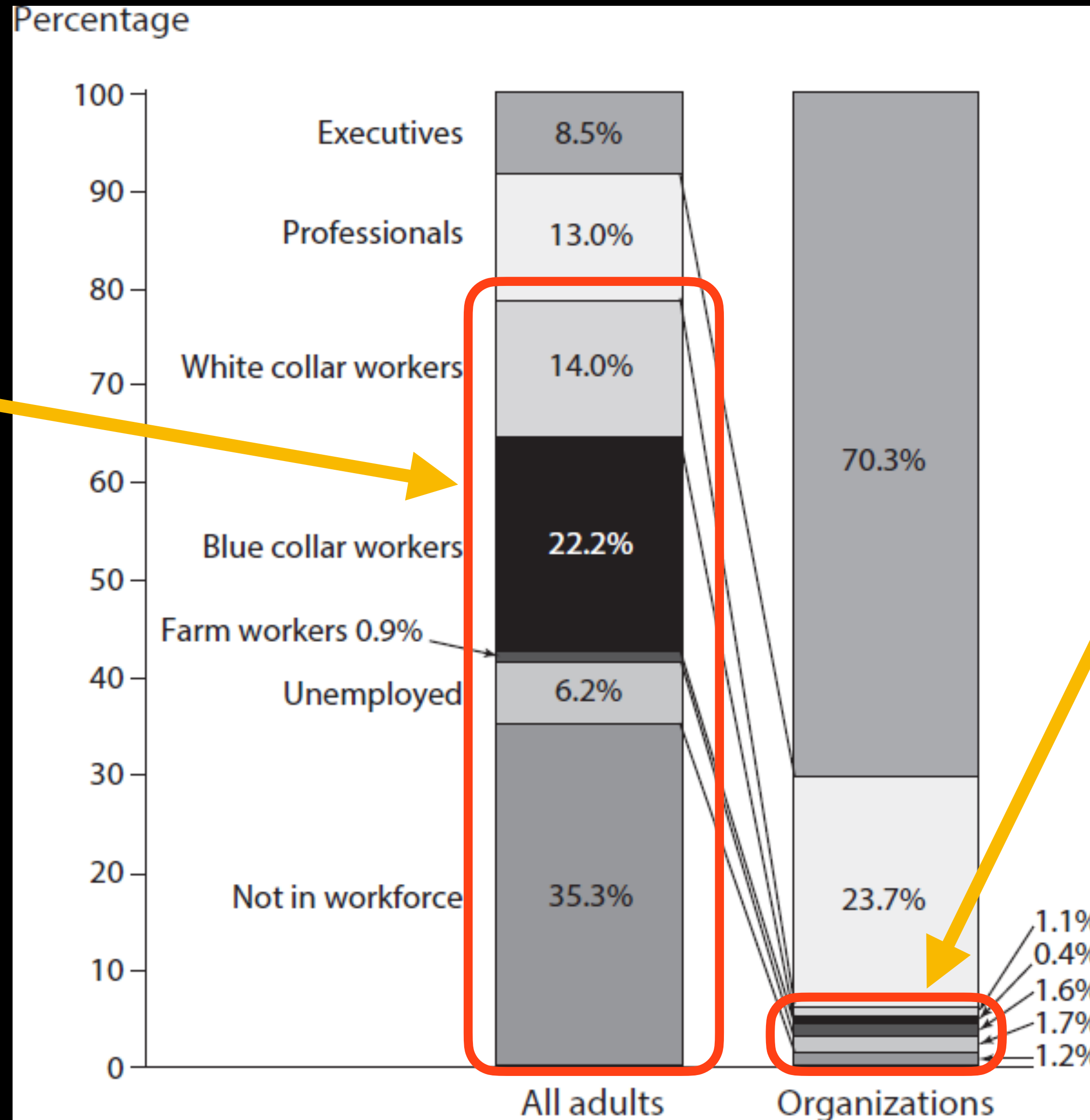
